### Pastoral Letter #9

13<sup>th</sup> May 2020

Dear Church Family,

I remember when the global pandemic started, I tried to be as optimistic as possible. I thought we'd be out of church for a few weeks, would probably miss Easter but might be back by Pentecost. And then a Church of England briefing indicated that it might be September, and I started to plan in my mind a Back to Church Service for the start of the autumn term and also think about Harvest. And then last week the Bishops said that they were doubtful that we'd be back for Christmas, at which my heart sank. With every announcement, I'd start to hook my hope on a return and then be disappointed. This week, the government are suggesting we could return in July, which seems overly optimistic given what the Bishops are saying. What this might look like we simply don't know, but it's likely *not* to involve sharing communion or singing. It might just be 'open for private prayer'.

I came across an article in the week that spoke about the 'Stockdale Paradox', a term I hadn't heard before. An admiral in the US Navy, James Stockdale, survived 8 years as a POW in a North Vietnamese prison camp. When asked who of his fellow prisoners struggled to make it out alive, he replied, *'The optimists – the ones who thought they'd be out by Christmas/Easter/Thanksgiving, and saw every festival come and go. They died of a broken heart.'* How James Stockdale coped – now known as the Stockdale Paradox - was by developing the ability to hold two opposing but equally true things at once: The faith that we *will* prevail in the end; whilst confronting the sad reality of the current situation. I *do* believe that this virus will be beaten (but probably not just yet), and I also believe God to be the source of our love, creativity, resilience, kindness and humour that enables us to cope with our current reality. And I draw support from the Holy Spirit who, we learn from this Sunday's gospel reading, was sent to come alongside the disciples to provide an eternal source of strength on which to draw, when we just don't have what it takes on our own. Also, I have faith that God is already present in the future we keep pinning our hopes and fears to, so maybe it's about time I let go of them and simply trust that he has this in hand. I'd like to think this might help the other optimists among us too!

Whilst we wait for the time when we can meet together physically, online services will continue. I hope that those of you with Internet access are able to view them easily and feel that you are taking part. Please follow the steps in the last two Pastoral Letters if you're not too confident in finding your way to the right place on a Sunday morning.
